Greetings from the Office of Volunteer and Community Services! During this Fall semester students continue to put forth great effort in performing a variety of volunteer and community service activities throughout the local area and beyond.

Many of our students, which included individual volunteers and student groups as well athletes accomplished an array of tasks. Student volunteers will again participate in the eleventh annual Relay for Life event, a walk to benefit the American Cancer Society. It offers everyone in the community as well as students an opportunity to participate in the fight against cancer. Over four hundred and fifty students participated in this important endeavor this past year. Over seventy volunteers did the Adopt-A-Beach Clean-up to enhance the beaches of the Great Lakes during Earth Month.

Fredonia student volunteers were involved in cooking and serving meals to impoverished families at the local friendly kitchen;

providing social and recreational activities to seniors helping to improve their quality of life, such as Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia taking the time to perform songs at various nursing homes. Student volunteers were making improvements to the local environment; assisting local youth through mentoring along with many other service activities.

Our students also showed care and compassion to those who were in the greatest need by assisting families through Habitat for Humanity rehabbing and helping to build affordable housing. Student groups will join a variety of volunteers in the streets of Fredonia for the annual Buffalo News Kids Day which helps to raise funds for Women and Children's Hospital of Buffalo.

Sister Circle

Sister Circle is very active in the community through volunteer services and open community events. For example, Sister Circle has a long-standing commitment with the Dunkirk Boys and Girls Club. Their annual Ice Cream Social event is one of many ways that they strengthen kid's self-image through support and encouragement.

President Jayla Williams states, "we have gained an enlightened sense of self through giving back to the fortunate and the young." During their service at Dunkirk School 7 Halloween Party, Sister Circle had the opportunity to interact through face painting and dancing with the children. Their involvement with children has allowed them to become positive role models.

Their unyielding motivation comes from their advisor, Joyce H. Smith, the Coordinator of Volunteer and Community Services. Williams states, "through our work with other service agencies, we feel as though we have gained an excellent source of hardworking ladies to be utilized as future interns or contacts for other successful projects." Blackhorse Women's Rugby

Blackhorse Women's Rugby is a club sport on the State University of New York at Fredonia's campus whose mission is to teach its participants the sport of rugby. This sport, however, goes beyond the field and all the while instills qualities of leadership, confidence, and community service. Their motivation for service comes from the variety of women that they have on their team.

Blackhorse Women's Rugby has participated in Fall Sweep and Kisses for Pups. Kisses for Pups is an annual fundraiser that Blackhorse Women's Rugby created in 2011 to raise money for the Chautauqua County Humane Society. Their involvement in Fall Sweep has helped their teammates build connections within the community. In addition, the team hosted Get In The Game, a convention for youth to learn how to play sports, specifically, Rugby. Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia

Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia is a National Music Fraternity. Their mission is to create a bond between musical students and to work together in order to advance music in America. Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia performs in many local assisted living homes. Their performances take place at Fredonia Place, an assisted living facility, as well as St. Columban's on the Lake Retirement Home. Aside from their talent, they also host the annual Safe Halloween which is an event that provides a safe environment for children to trick-or-treat. The President Matthew Garcia states, "it gives kids the opportunity to enjoy Halloween while seeing Fredonia by interacting with the student body."

The founder of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, Ossian Everett Mills, inspired them to become involved in community service. He originated the practice of performing and distributing flowers for patients in hospitals. This eventually turned into what they now call "Mills Music Missions." Garcia states, "this act of kindness is embedded in the foundation of what it means to be a member of Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia."

Their performances in the local assisted living homes have opened their eyes to what it means to go above and beyond for someone. Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia plans on continuing traditions such as Safe Halloween, Ice Cream Social, and Mill's Music Missions. They also wish to plan an event along with the Fredonia Feminist Club as apart of the "It's on Us" campaign, which raises awareness for sexual assault and rape on college campuses.

The American Cancer Society is a nationwide community-based voluntary health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer as a major health problem by preventing cancer, saving lives, and diminishing suffering from cancer, through research, education, advocacy, and service. Relay for Life is the signature fundraiser for the Society. This event gives everyone in the community a chance to celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember loved ones, and fight back against the disease.

Relay for Life, created by a partnership between the student organization Colleges Against Cancer and the Buffalo chapter of the American Cancer Society, is the world's largest fundraising effort. The American Cancer Society relies on the strength of millions which includes Fredonia State volunteers.

Colleges Against Cancer works directly with the American Cancer Society's Community Manager, Mariah Turk. Turk states, "students are the future of the American Cancer Society because they are what keep us thriving. We wouldn't be able to do it without their help." Over 450 participants including students, faculty and staff were engaged in this year's event.
